Before he became a caller, Bill wrote resumes. His typewriter was an extention of the man and over the years he has used it repeatedly in service of CALLERLAB. He was part of the initial group of caller coaches that developedthe Caller-Coach Accreditation process. He took part in the meeting of coaches that negotiated agreement on standardization of the terms we would use teaching callers. He was Chairman of the Caller Training Committee and chief writer and editor of the Curriculum Guidelines of Caller Training. Whe the Technical Supplement to that document was published, Bill wrote several major sections if it and shared actively in editing the whole document. His morst recent contribution came during the development of CALLERLAB's Standard Application documents. The preserntaion format that makes these books understandable is Bill Peters.

Over the years, Bill and I have had a running disagreement about square dancing programming. Bill has believed that dancers are happiest when they are at the very limit of their dancing abilitu. He wants to keep them close to the cliff of failure without pushing them over the edge. I, on the other hand, continue to believe that the dancer's need to be challenged is good bit less than most of us think. I have strongly advocated for programmign so that dancers are put at risk of failure rarely. In the mid 1980's Bill and I debated this issue at a CALLERLAB convention. The poster in the lobby of the hotel listed the subject of the debate as "Programming for Survival". A number of non-CALLERLAB guests in the

hotel, asked at the front desk what CALLERLAB was and were we computer scientists. They wondered whose “survival” we were debating.

It is my privilege to award this Gold Card membership to Bill Peters. It is richly deserved.
